During this crisis, the Y has focused on engaging elementary students for emotional stability, as well as continued growth and learning. By providing elearning opportunities for these young learners, we also provide a routine and sense of normalcy for all family members.

With the most stringent safety protocols in place, we are committed to keeping our students healthy, safe and actively learning in an nurturing environment.

Katy Zamparo shared, "It was a difficult decision to place my twins, Emma and Leo, in the Bright Beginnings Preschool Kindergarten Round Up program. There were so many unknowns, not much data about kids gathering, I thought maybe it would be safer to keep them home." She decided to put her trust in the Y. "I can tell you that it was 100% the right decision. They are safe, learning a lot and having fun. They love it and run to the door full of excitement when I drop them off."

SUPPORTING FAMILIES IN NEED

This past holiday season, together with our members, we focused on supporting members of our Y family in need of assistance.

In addition to selling more than 500 trees to raise money for our financial assistance fund, we were also able to ensure a happy holiday for families in need. Through our Angel Tree program, our members helped us fulfill the holiday wishes of 36 children—ensuring they woke up to find presents under their Christmas tree. We also provided Christmas trees to several families, and meal boxes with a delicious holiday meal for 100 neighbors in need—donated by Jewel-Osco.
